

House of Four Winds (540 Calle Principal) Both days, 10am—4pm. Built in the early 1830s the adobe displays California's first weather vane, hence its name. The building has the desk that was used for the signing of California's first constitution. Owned and operated by the Monterey Civic Club.

Casa Serrano (412 Pacific St.) Both days, 10am—4pm. Built in 1843 by Florencio Serrano and family. Adobe houses one of the largest collections of work by California artist Jo Moro; other well-known Monterey artists also showcased. Adobe was purchased and restored in 1958 by the Monterey History and Art Association.

Mayo Hayes O'Donnell Library (155 Van Buren St.) Both days, 11am—4pm. Built in 1876 as Saint James Episcopal Church, then purchased and moved to its current site in 1969 by Monterey History & Art Association. The non-circulating library has a vast collection of material about Monterey and California history. Visitors and researchers welcome. https://mhod.weebly.com

Joseph Boston Store (Adjacent to Scott Street and behind the Pacific House/Memory Garden) Saturday Only, 11am—3pm. Enter the 1850s and visit one of Monterey's first general stores selling 1850s themed items, history books, and local, artisan products. Be sure to check out Monterey's first safe, hence the building's name, Casa del Oro. Receive an old-fashioned candy stick with any purchase!
